**Wylie House Museum Tours**, 10 a.m.–2 p.m., 317 E. Second Street (812) 855-6224. Take a tour of one of Bloomington's oldest surviving structures. Wylie House, built in 1835 by IU's first president, Andrew Wylie, is now operated as a museum. A recently commissioned scenic mural in the entry hall, based on historic drawings from the 19th century will be of special interest to visitors this year, as will the 19th century barn that has been moved to the site and is being converted into an educational center with office space! But please pardon our construction site "mess."

**Lilly Library Tour**, 4 p.m., East 7th Street. The Lilly Library, IU's rare book and manuscript library, houses more than 400,000 rare books and 7.5 million manuscripts. Exhibitions include a selection of books about clocks and highlights from the collections such as the first printing of the Declaration of Independence, the New Testament of the Gutenberg Bible, an Oscar won by director John Ford, and the Shakespeare First Folio. The new Slocum Room, which features more than 400 mechanical puzzles, will be open.

**Herman B Wells Library Tour**, North Jordan Ave. and East 10th St. Shhhhhh! Or not. If you think of libraries only as silent study halls, you'll be surprised by the way students learn today. The Herman B Wells Library is a popular destination for students to meet classmates, practice presentations, or work on group projects. In addition to online resources, Wells Library has a prized collection of books — more than 4.5 million volumes. Students especially enjoy the Information Commons, which the editors of the student newspaper called a "one-stop, work-until-you-wilt megaplex of technology."
